A Note from the Pastor

Someone asked me the other day, “What television shows does your family watch?” At first I thought about the busyness of our daily lives and I wanted to laugh! Between two churches, three children, school work, basketball, and the like, what television? But then I remembered the important season we are in just now. No, not Lent. It’s American Idol season. And American Idol is a show all three of the Ray children agree on, unless there is a Clemson ballgame being broadcast!

American Idol has captured the attention of many folk as young persons from across the country compete for fame and fortune as popular singers. Some people who audition for the show are goofy; some are downright rude; some are sincere; many are very gifted. And as the season goes on, we all wonder, “Who will be the next American Idol?” Of course, by the end it’s all a popularity contest as America votes on their favorite contestant. Like school board elections, the person with the most votes wins!

American Idol provides a stark contrast to the life, death, and resurrection of the One we call “Lord and Savior.” Indeed, the stories we will share as we move from Lent to Holy Week are stories of death, loss, despair and failure. Jesus’ journey is not one of popularity, victory, and fame. Instead, the Christian church has always seen these words of the prophet Isaiah as descriptive of Jesus’ identity as the Son of God:

There was nothing beautiful or majestic about his appearance,
nothing to attract us to him.
He was despised and rejected—
a man of sorrows, acquainted with deepest grief.
We turned our backs on him and looked the other way.
He was despised, and we did not care. (Isaiah 53:2b-3, New Living Tr.)

This means, then, that those who follow Jesus, the Suffering Servant, will sometimes find that our journey takes us to places that bring ridicule and rejection rather than fame and fortune. Take a simple example. You go to the local restaurant for breakfast and begin chatting with the folk who are there. Soon the conversation turns to the problem of illegal immigration in the United States. At first, opinions are offered that vary from person to person. But then things turn ugly. Someone begins talking about those “dirty Mexicans” and before you know it, you are knee deep in a conversation filled with venom and hatred. And you think to yourself, “It would be far easier to ask for forgiveness from God for not speaking up than to face this bunch by saying something.”

It’s the challenge we sometimes face, because we often want a Jesus who is famous, well-loved, a kind of universal American Idol. Instead, though, the One we claim as Lord still suffers with those who suffer, stands up for those who are despised and rejected, carries the burdens of those who are heavy-laden. And what’s more, he invites us to join him on this journey, living as his witnesses...even when it hurts.

May God help us all to increase in our faith and courage as we journey with Jesus to Jerusalem and the cross in these holy days.

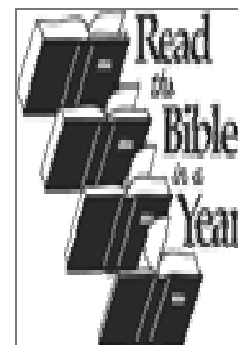

Listening With New Ears

We hear a lot today about the United States being a “post-racial” society or this being a “post-racial” era. What could this possibly mean? We could hardly expect to leave behind all that we’ve learned (good things and bad things) in the “pre-post-racial” era.

Would that we could truly say that this was a “post-racist” society — that racial stereotypes and baggage no longer affected persons and families of color. Remember, that racism is not just (or perhaps, not even predominantly) a feeling or an intention. Racism is a series of structures that affects persons of color disproportionately with the burdens of the work of living and excludes those same persons disproportionately from the benefits of their work and accomplishments.

Statistics help us to assess our structures. The National Urban League’s 2009 State of Black America report notes that African Americans remain twice as likely as whites to be unemployed, three times more likely to live in poverty and more than six times as likely to be incarcerated. Twenty-eight percent of Hispanic adults who are citizens or legal permanent residents of the United States lack health insurance, reports a study by the Pew Hispanic Center. This number more than doubles when statistics include undocumented Hispanics.

National crime victimization surveys reveal that Whites perpetrate 57 percent of the violent crimes committed against American Indians. Yet the incarceration rate of Native Americans is 38 percent higher than the national rate. The U.S. Commission on Civil Rights attributes this higher rate to differential treatment by the criminal justice system, lack of access to adequate counsel and racial profiling.

These statistics tell us something about the results of our ability as a society to produce “common wealth” — prosperity for all. The combination of race and income in housing segregation isolates many persons of color from quality services (health care, schools, markets, etc.). The search for root causes is maddening as the literature focuses on the intertwining of both of race and class in a pattern of obstacles and risks.

It also reinforces “exceptionalism.” Extraordinary people like President Obama, Supreme Court Justice Sotomayor and Chief Wilma Mankiller achieved prominence, despite the impediments that race or class may have presented to them or their families. Does this indicate that the barriers do not exist? No, it illustrates that these are extraordinary people. The reason we turn to statistics to evaluate the racism of our society, rather than the stories of heroes and heroines, is because we need to look at the impact of race and class on the access of ordinary people to this “common wealth.”

Of course, I do not intend to imply that there are no persons of color whose family background and access to benefits provide them with temporal security — of course there are. What we are highlighting in this issue is the pernicious intertwining of racism and class (or racism and poverty) in disproportionately impeding the flourishing of persons of color.

Unfortunately, Response readers know without my saying it, this can become a “triple threat” when gender is added to the mix.

So I invite you, listen with new ears to the pundits’ claims connected to this post-racial era. Remember Jesus’ interaction with the Samaritan woman and Peter’s with Cornelius and Paul’s declaration that there is neither Jew nor Greek in the household of God. What can it mean for us, members of United Methodist Women, as we seek to become whole persons through Jesus Christ and form a supportive community? It means work and prayer and being together. We must continue our deep listening and critical thinking. It means speaking out.

Emergency Physicians Warn Symptoms of CO Poisoning Can Mimic Other Illnesses

Washington, DC - Chiller weather in many parts of the country has people turning up the heat and possibly increasing their chances of harming themselves and their families. Emergency physicians are warning the public of the dangers of carbon monoxide, or CO, an odorless and colorless gas found in the emissions of fireplaces, gas stoves, water heaters, kerosene heaters, furnaces and boilers. "If you get bad headaches or suffer from fatigue, nausea, dizziness or confusion you may easily confuse those symptoms with the flu." " It's very important that people know the symptoms of dangerous levels of gas in their homes and, more importantly, know how to prevent the buildup of CO in their homes in the first place."

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), more than 500 Americans die each year from unintentional CO poisoning. Severe symptoms of CO poisoning include vomiting, loss of consciousness, heart irregularity and breathing difficulties, but these symptoms can vary widely based on the exposure level, duration and the health and age of an individual.

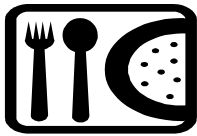
"Every home should have a carbon monoxide detector and you should never ignore the alarm or turn it off without having the sources of CO checked in your home." "It is much better to be safe than sorry when dealing with CO because it can be very dangerous."

To protect your family this winter, ACEP provides the following safety advice:

- Install a carbon monoxide detector on each level of your home, especially near the sleeping areas.
- Have gas appliances installed by a qualified professional.
- Use only appliances that vent fumes outside.
- If you choose to use an unvented fuel-burning space heater, only use it while someone is awake to monitor it.
- Never use a gas range or oven to heat a home.
- Never use a charcoal grill inside.
- Never leave the motor running of a vehicle parked in an enclosed garage.
- Turn on the exhaust fan over your gas stove when using it.
- Make certain the fireplace flues are open during use.

Have gas furnaces, water heaters, clothes dryers, fireplaces and flues inspected annually by a qualified service technician.
