Health and Welfare

Eating Disorders

An eating disorder is present when a person experiences severe disturbances in eating behavior, such as extreme reduction in food intake or extreme overeating, or feelings of extreme distress or concern about body weight or shape, according to the National Institutes of Mental Health (NIMH). There are two primary types of eating disorders: anorexia nervosa and bulimia nervosa. Additionally, there is a category referred to as eating disorders not otherwise specified (EDNOS). A third common type of eating disorder, binge eating disorder, is considered an EDNOS. Eating disorders typically affect girls and young women; however, boys, men, and older women can also suffer from the disorders. Untreated eating disorders can lead to serious consequences including cardiovascular conditions, kidney failure, and even death.

Anorexia Nervosa

Individuals who suffer from anorexia nervosa view themselves as overweight even when they are dangerously thin and malnourished. They become obsessed with food and weight control and often diet and exercise compulsively, refuse to eat, or eat tiny portions of particular foods. The NIMH reports that anorexia nervosa is marked by:

- Emaciation
- Unwillingness to maintain a normal or healthy weight
- A distorted body image
- Intense fear of gaining weight
- Lack of menstruation
- Disturbed eating behavior

Bulimia Nervosa

- People who suffer from bulimia nervosa binge on excessive quantities of food, and then compensate by purging—vomiting, fasting, excessively exercising, or misusing laxatives. Bingeing and purging tends to be done secretly because it usually causes the individual to feel ashamed or disgusted. Symptoms of bulimia nervosa include:

- Electrolyte imbalance
- Gastro esophageal reflux disorder
- Problems with the teeth and oral cavity
- Inflamed and sore throat
- Intestinal irritation

Individuals who have binge eating disorder also binge on excessive quantities of food, but they do not purge their bodies of food or calories afterward.

Treatment

In many cases, eating disorders occur with other psychiatric disorders such as depression or substance abuse. Many patients with eating disorders can be treated effectively with psychological treatment and medication. In chronic cases, treatment is often customized for the patient and generally includes medical care and monitoring; medication; nutritional counseling; and psychotherapy. Sometimes, hospitalization is necessary.

If you or a loved one might be suffering from an eating disorder, contact a physician as soon as possible for diagnosis and treatment options.
