A Note from the Pastor

The Early Christian Liked to Eat, Too!

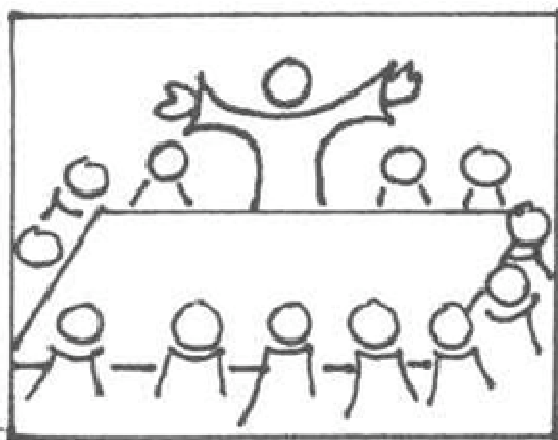
We like to eat at this church! Breakfast, lunch, dinner/supper, we like it all. And, of course, when we eat together we are carrying on a tradition of the early Christian church where, according to the book of Acts:

They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers (Acts 2:42).

We believe the practice of celebrating Holy Communion was always connected to a full fellowship meal in the earliest days of Christianity. Over time, the ritual meal became separate and Christians began sharing only bread and wine in remembrance of the mighty deeds of God in Jesus Christ. In some ways, the separation of the Lord's Supper from the fellowship meal is unfortunate. Why? Because it leads us to believe that real, common meals are not the place where Christ dwells. Yet the early church affirmed that the living Lord was present with them whenever they shared at a table.

On Sunday, September 6 we will celebrate at the Lord's Table in our morning worship service. This month we will also be using a beautiful new table that the Quilters purchased for our church. Why a new table? Over the last 30 – 40 years, church architects have designed tables that allow the pastor or presider to get behind the table with his/her face toward the congregation rather than standing or kneeling with his/ her back to the congregation. The practice of facing the congregation goes back to the earliest descriptions we have of Sunday worship. The pastor, when facing the gathered church, appears to be a part of the whole church family and not removed from it with her/his back to the community. One website depicts an early communion service like this:

We are all a part of the Table of Christ. As your pastor, I have the blessing of thanking God on your behalf for all God has done. But this act of prayer is not mine to do alone. We are all united in our prayer to God. Our new Table will help us join our voices (together!) as we sing, "Holy, Holy, Holy" on Sundays and beyond.

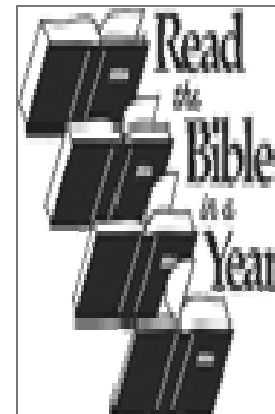

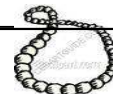

SHARING OUR RESPONSE MAGAZINE

On The Gulf Coast there are two United Methodist Women Supported Institutions that make the lives of children and families their main concern as they help rebuild after Hurricane Katrina. One is the North Rampart Community Center in New Orleans, and the other is the Moore Community House in Biloxi, Mississippi.

The Rampart Center helps in many ways, providing after school care for children to have a safe place to go. They also have art lessons, music, exercise, and homework help. Coach Jeffrey Parker works with them to get focused and get over their fears and sufferings. Soon they are having a “blast”. The children range from pre-k to 18 years and come from 32 schools around the New Orleans area. Most are African-American and many are from single parent homes. Were it not for this center and its many programs, these kids would be out on the street.

Ninety miles up the coast is the Moore Community House. They deal with similar problems that the Rampart Center has, from poverty to Hurricane Katrina damage. The Moore House works with neighborhoods on the east end of the city. The community is home to African-Americans, Vietnamese, and lots of white ethnic groups.

The Moore House buildings were badly damaged and some destroyed. But with the help of many people they are slowly rebuilding. Some of the programs have restarted, one of which is the after-school and child care centers. They now serve 75 children in the programs, with a long waiting list. When the new child care building opens later this year, they will be able to serve 115 children.



The difference Moore Community House and North Rampart Community Center is making in their communities can be measured in love, God’s Help, and the individuals and families who are being helped by these two institutions supported by the United Methodist Women.

Health and Welfare

Approximately 40 million people throughout the United States experience indoor allergies. Because allergies and colds share some similar symptoms, such as sneezing and nasal congestion, people often mistake allergy symptoms for chronic colds. However, while allergies are associated with clear nasal discharge and itchy eyes and do not cause fever, colds are frequently accompanied by fever, sore throat, colored nasal discharge, and aches and pains. Additionally, allergies can persist throughout the year, and colds only last for approximately 7 days.

What are allergens?

Allergies are abnormal reactions to particular airborne particles known as allergens, which trigger a reaction from the body's immune system. Unlike seasonal allergens, perennial allergens are present during every season of the year. The most common household allergens include molds, dust mites, animal dander, and cockroaches. For those who suffer from exposure to household allergens, it is important to take steps to reduce or eliminate allergens, creating a healthier, cleaner environment. Consider the following recommendations for the American Academy of Allergy, Asthma, and Immunology.

Dropping form DUSTMITES are the most common trigger of indoor allergy and asthma symptoms. To minimize house dust:

- ...Change your cooling and heating system filters every month.
- ...Make sure that your home and car are vacuumed and dusted regularly.
- ... Wash bedding in water above 130 degrees.

MOLDS are generally found in bathrooms, kitchens, refrigerators, carpets, and garbage containers. To minimize exposure to indoor mold:

- ...Keep bathroom and kitchen surfaces clean and dry.
- ...Fix any leaky plumbing, and seal cracks where water can seep in to avoid mold buildup.
- ...Use a dehumidifier to reduce humidity in damp areas. Clean dehumidifiers weekly.
- ...Do not store clothes, papers, and other items in damp areas.

Nearly 10 million people who have pets are allergic to them. ANIMAL DANDER (dead skin), urine, and saliva can cause allergies. To minimize contact with allergens from a pet:

...Wash your pet every week. Someone who does not have allergies should brush the pet regularly, outside of the home.

- ...Vacuum and mop all of your floors frequently to remove excess animal dander.
- ...Try not to hug pets if you are allergic to them. Do not allow a pet to sleep in your bed.

Some species of COCKROACHES can thrive in various climates, not only where it is warm and tropical. Allergy symptoms are caused by a particular protein in cockroach droppings. To eliminate or minimize exposure:

- ... Keep bathroom and kitchen surfaces clean and dry.
- ... Fix any leaky plumbing, and seal cracks where water can seep in to avoid mold buildup.
- ... Use a dehumidifier to reduce humidity in damp areas. Clean dehumidifiers weekly.
- ... Do not store clothes, papers,

ALLERGY TREATMENT

Reducing exposure to allergens is an important step towards controlling allergies. However, untreated allergies can lead to asthma and other conditions, so it is important to seek treatment if symptoms continue. An immunologist can prescribe medicines such as antihistamines or decongestant. In many cases, a series of shots that, over time, may minimize or eliminate reactions to common allergens are recommended,. Symptoms may change, and medications may need to change with them, so it is important to see your physician regularly.

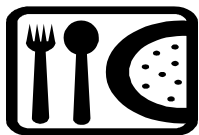
Bible Study
